Jerri first "met" Betty back in March of 2020 during the pandemic. Jerri signed up to be a volunteer Phone Pal, an initiative that was launched during COVID to help older adults to feel less socially isolated and lonely. She called Betty up, and they hit it off right away. Since that day, they have talked on the phone every week like clock-work.

"We talk about our flowers. I love flowers. I have a flower garden in my front and back yard, and Jerri and I have some of the same flowers," said Betty.

Jerri, who learned about Shepherd's Center and the Phone Pals program through Soroptimist Int'l Kansas City, an organization that encourages and empowers women, said that becoming a Phone Pal was a no-brainer for her.

"We can all use another friend. If there's someone out there who needs a friend or uplifting spirit, I am here to help," says Jerri. "She brings a positive light to my life and has a zest for life. She never has anything negative to say," said Jerri.

Jerri and Betty hope to meet in person, for the first time, on Betty's 80th birthday.


We are so happy to welcome her into the club. Next month's Signpost will include a profile of Angie....

girls". Congratulations, Candy!




July Meeting Notes

young women on track through this hot summer. She continues to encourage them to excel.


From Wakisha,

These resources included STEM, reading workshops and free etiquette classes."

SIA's Virtual 47th Biennial Convention Report Held July 22-23, 2022.

Kay Stewart attended as SIKC's delegate.

The opening session was held Friday night. The recognition of countries in the Federation was impressive. There were 19 countries represented: Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Ecuador, Guam, Japan, South Korea, Mexico, the territory of the Northern Mariana Islands, Palau, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Taiwan, the United States and Venezuela. The convention was broadcast in seven languages. Wow! It made me realize how much of our world I have not yet seen.

The keynote speaker Friday night was Malala Yousafzai, Nobel Prize Laureate. What an inspirational young woman. She was born in the Swat Valley of Pakistan. Her father ran a school for boys and girls and he felt strongly that girls should have every opportunity afforded to boys. In 2007 she was eleven years old and was accompanying her father to other parts of Pakistan to advocate for girls education. Her father would talk to the men and she would talk to the women. Her activism started then.

The Taliban swept into Swat Valley the next year and from that moment on, women and girls were isolated, housebound and covered completely from head to toe in burkas. No more schooling for girls.

Her father continued to educate girls and one day while she was on a school bus the Taliban pulled her from the bus and shot her in the face leaving her for dead. She was sent to the UK where she underwent multiple surgeries to repair her face. She continued her education and activism in the UK. When she was 17, she was in her chemistry class when the school principal pulled her out to inform her that she had won the Nobel Peace Prize. She is the youngest person ever to receive that honor. She had many offers to fill multiple roles but she knew she must finish her degree if she was to keep her credibility advocating for education for all girls. She graduated with degrees in Philosophy, Politics and Economics.

Soroptimist History



The Soroptimist Code of Ethics

Did you know that Soroptimist has an official Code of Ethics?

Delegates to the 1932 biennial convention in Sacramento, California adopted a lengthy code of ethics. By 1935 federation president, Amelia Johnson, had appointed a committee to revise this code. A letter to all clubs in the federation requested recommendations on the revision. Several clubs replied that the pledge was a complete code of ethics. The members of the revision committee agreed. The committee proposed a considerably shorter code of ethics, with the pledge appended.

The delegates of the 1936 biennial convention in <u>Kansas City</u>, <u>Missouri</u> enthusiastically adopted this revised code of ethics:

"My business principles exact:

full recognition of the rights of others;

acknowledgement of the responsibilities of citizenship

and the duty of discharging the obligations entailed;

the use of my position at all times to the end that a higher level

of human ideals and achievements may be attained."

This concludes the series on the History of Soroptimist. Our challenge is to continue to grow and change with the times while keeping the original mission of Soroptimist foremost in our minds. Simply put: Strive to improve the lives of women and girls in our community, our nation, and the world.
