Soroptimist International of Kansas City is part of a global volunteer organization that provides women and girls with access to the education and training they need to achieve economic empowerment.

Soroptimist International of Kansas City is a century-old professional women's organization with a mission to empower women and girls to overcome financial insecurity.

The Live Your Dream Award is Soroptimist International of the Americas' signature program. Each year, more than \$3 million is disbursed through the Live Your



Dream Awards program to more than 2,300 women, many of whom have overcome enormous obstacles, including poverty, domestic violence, the death of a spouse, or substance abuse.

The award provides women who serve as the primary financial providers for their families with the financial resources to offset costs associated with their efforts to attain higher education or additional skills and training. The award can be used for tuition, books, childcare, transportation, or any other education-related expense.

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SI Kansas City History



Butler Manufacturing's company newsmagazine, "The Butler Bee", December 1952 carried the following article.

On Sunday, May 11, 1952, almost ten months to the day after devastation had swept the Kaw River bottoms, families who had been dispossessed by the flood waters found new faith in the dedication of the Randall Jesse Community House in Trailer City.

Here the rolling ground is studded with a thousand-odd trailer houses in which approximately 1,000 children and 2,000 adults have been carrying on family life as best they can since early last fall. From the single trailer with an elderly man and wife to the three-trailer arrangement of the family with fourteen children—all represent hearth and home to a community living in circumstances more like the pioneers of a hundred years ago than like most of us today.

Members of the Soroptimist Club of Kansas City, MO, have been interested in Trailer City from the start. They immediately "adopted" thirty-five families, supplying them with winter bedding and other essentials. But members of their Service Committee—Mrs. Anton K. Westh, Mrs. John Spaulding, Mrs. Martha Franklin, and others—became increasingly concerned about the children.

Until the necessities of shelter and clothing had been met there was no time to think of recreation and community life. Last December, however, the Soroptimists announced their intention to try to provide a Community House for the new neighborhood, a place where all members of all the families might meet and take part in activities that interested them, a place to spend pleasant evenings getting acquainted, and a place for the children after school.

The Soroptimists knew they were tackling a big project, but they went to work with a will. Mrs. Franklin, as head of the "how-to-get-it-done" committee, went to local business firms, to the labor organizations, and to other civic-minded groups and individuals and stated her case well.

Months of hard work and cooperation were brought to wonderfully happy end when the Community House was dedicated recently. Miss Adalain Taylor, president of the Soroptimist Club, presided during the ceremonies. Indicating the spacious building with its attractive decoration and modern equipment, Miss Taylor said, "All this is a vital evidence of the spirit of cooperation which can exist among all groups when the cause is worthy."

Our Company (Butler Manufacturing), which made the building available at a minimum cost, was signaled out for recognition. Besides introducing Mr. Speakman to the audience, Miss Taylor mentioned the advice and help in erection and planning given by Wilbur Larkin and Clark Kjorlaug, both of whom sat on the platform during the program.

The climax of the afternoon came when the dedicatory plaque was presented to Randall Jessee, for whom the Community House was named in recognition of his tireless coverage of the flood over WDAF-TV, and the continued appeals and public information he gave on the progress of Trailer City and the post-flood rehabilitation of the families affected.

The Rev. Dr. John Nanson, who gave the invocation, announced that church services would begin at the Community House the following Sunday. A survey of the families, he said, revealed that twenty-three denominations were represented and that the families were eager to begin religious observances. A full program of events was scheduled to begin immediately at the Center, including Scouting for boys and girls, athletics, and evening programs including movies, television, games and talent shows.

Our amazing sister, **Terri Goddard**, who serves as the Director of Corporate Engagement at FosterAdopt Connect, planned and executed an incredible fundraiser that raised **over \$900,000** to support foster and adoptive children and families in the Kansas City area. What an achievement!

Angie and I worked in the silent auction area, helping guests navigate the online bidding site, while Lynn and Jon brought their energy and charm to selling beads for the lively **Heads and Tails** game. They were *perfect for the job*. Thanks to their enthusiasm, a lot of the beads sold right before the game began!

Having played Heads and Tails before at my former club's fundraising events, I knew I had to join in the fun. I bought six beads online early on and another six once I arrived. One by one, participants guessed whether the auctioneer's virtual coin would land on heads or tails - hands on your head for heads, hands on your hips for tails. If you guessed wrong, off went a bead! The last person standing with beads would win the prize.

And guess who won? **Me... Mysti Meiers!** I was stunned! I never win anything, but that night I walked away with over \$800 worth of wine and spirits, including a special bottle of bourbon valued at \$400–500.

Beyond the excitement, the evening held deep meaning for me. As an adoptee, it was profoundly moving to support a great organization like FosterAdopt Connect, and helping children and families thrive through adoption and foster care.

But what made the night truly special was us. Standing side by side with my Soroptimist sisters reminded me that our organization is so much more than the projects we do. Which, don't get me wrong, the things we do in SIKC is extremely important work but it's also about friendship, compassion, and lifting each other up.

Together, we make a difference in our community and in each other's lives.


